Sustainable Sammamish **Energy Efficiency at Home**

Buildings and energy usage comprise many emissions globally and within the City of Sammamish.

Did you know that approximately 82% of emissions in Sammamish are attributable to energy use? Energy use from residential buildings makes up approximately 88% of these emissions because most homes in Sammamish are more energy-intensive single-family units.

Do your part! The spring season is the perfect time to reassess energy usage at home and consciously reduce your environmental footprint.

Energy efficiency not only benefits the planet, it can also help save money on utility bills. There are many simple yet effective tips to maximize energy efficiency in your home:



Heating and Cooling

Seal Those Leaks – Check for drafts around windows, doors, and any other openings in your home. Sealing leaks with weatherstripping or similar can prevent cold air from entering during spring evenings and keep your home cooler in the summer, reducing the need for excessive heating and air conditioning.

Adjust Thermostat Settings – Manually set your thermostat to lower temperatures as the weather gets warmer. Consider using a smart or programmable thermostat to manage your heating and cooling systems effectively. These devices can adjust the temperature based on when you're home and awake to save energy and cut costs.

Let the Air Flow – Use natural ventilation by opening your windows and doors when outdoor temperatures are mild. Cross ventilation can help cool your home on warmer days without air conditioning.



Lighting and Appliances

Upgrade to LED lighting – Consider replacing old incandescent bulbs with energy-efficient ones. These bulbs use significantly less energy and last much longer, providing cost and emission reductions over time and reducing the need for replacement bulbs.

Take Advantage of Natural Light – Longer daylight allows one to use natural daylight by opening curtains and blinds during the day. This not only reduces the need for artificial lighting but also enhances the ambiance of your living space and lowers your electricity usage, which means lower utility bills.

Unplug unused electronics – Many electronics and appliances consume energy even when turned off but plugged in. This is known as standby power consumption. You can eliminate this extra energy usage by unplugging devices such as chargers, computers, and entertainment systems.


2023 Volunteer of the Year

On Saturday, January 27, 2024, the City hosted its annual Volunteer Appreciation Event to celebrate the numerous volunteer programs and individual volunteer accomplishments. In total, 35 members from the Council, Parks & Recreation Commission, Human Services Commission, Planning Commission, Stewardship Programs (Stormwater, Plant & Lake), Heritage Society, Sammamish Botanical Garden Society, and Community Van Drivers attended the event. Volunteers collectively reported over 10,000 volunteer hours for the City in 2023.

Abby Arroyo, a senior at Skyline High School, was awarded 2023 Volunteer of the Year for her exemplary work on the Sammamish Youth Board and as a Community Service Liaison.

Abby joined the Sammamish Youth Board in 2022 and has actively organized community service opportunities, such as a food drive in partnership with the Issaguah Food Bank that produced 100 nut-free and gluten-free Power Packs for students in need. Abby also worked with other Youth Board members to gather over 1,200 supplies for infants and children donated to KidVantage. She is working on even more volunteer opportunities, including two more fundraiser drives and a hands-on event to sort donations.

As Community Service Liaison for the Youth Board, she has brought these great opportunities forward for other members to participate, elevating the Youth Board experience for her peers. Janie Walzer, the staff liaison to the Youth Board, said of Abby, "She is an amazing representative for our City. I truly believe that she embodies everything a volunteer should be: compassionate, hardworking, and someone who works to better the lives of others in our community. It is great that we could recognize her with this award."

Critical Areas Ordinance Update

The City of Sammamish is updating the Critical Areas Ordinance to ensure that regulations meet state and local requirements and sufficiently protect ecologically sensitive areas. These include critical aquifer recharge areas (CARAs), frequently flooded areas, geologically hazardous areas, habitat conservation areas, migration corridors, streams, and wetlands. Protecting critical areas is crucial to preserve natural resources and the health of local ecosystems. This update is a collaborative effort between the City, environmental experts, and community stakeholders and is set to be completed by the end of the year.

Public input is invaluable in shaping the future of the community. Attend upcoming public meetings to share your insights on the Critical Areas Ordinance Update process, or visit the Critical Areas Ordinance booth at the Sammamish Farmer's Market on May 15. It is important for stakeholders, including property owners, developers, and local businesses, to familiarize themselves with Critical Areas Ordinance. The community's compliance with these ordinances is vital to fostering sustainable growth in Sammamish.






Community members who choose to participate will be required to complete photo authorizations, granting the City permission to use their content not only for the time capsule project but also for social media, newsletters, and other web content.

Private Stormwater System Inspection Program

The City's private stormwater system inspection program started before Sammamish became a city! King County inspected privately owned stormwater systems on the City's behalf until the City hired staff in 2010 to perform these inspections. The program ensures private stormwater systems comply with local requirements and function properly. City staff inspects nearly 200 privately owned systems every year.

Stormwater systems collect stormwater runoff before it flows into our streams and lakes., lakes, and Lake Sammamish. Private stormwater systems often include stormwater ponds, swales, ditches, pipes, and catch basins. Stormwater systems protect property and buildings from flooding and improve water quality.

Property owners must clean and maintain their stormwater system. It is important for system owners to know that failing to maintain their stormwater system could result in penalties.

Town Center Plan and Development Code Revision for Enhanced Affordable Housing

The City is amending its Town Center Plan and Development Code in alignment with the ongoing Comprehensive Plan Periodic update process. This initiative aims to increase the availability of affordable housing in the Town Center subarea, focusing on creating a more diverse and accessible range of housing options for our community.

Essential elements of this work include conducting a thorough audit of existing Town Center-related documents to identify necessary amendments, preparing a Supplemental Environmental Impact Statement (SEIS) to explore the addition of up to 2,000 residential units and an expansion of commercial space by 200,000 square feet, both linked to promotion of diverse and affordable housing types; and updating the Town Center Subarea Plan and development regulations. These updates will consider changes since the original plan's adoption in 2008, past development and current development proposals, and the need for improved infrastructure and transportation planning to support the area's growth.

This initiative aims to broaden the availability of affordable and diverse housing options in the City. By adding incentives and reducing barriers, this work seeks practical routes to expand the diversity of housing types and price ranges available within our community that are broadly recognized needs.

The project team is working closely with its internal partners and consultant team to finalize a complete first draft of the 2024 Comprehensive Plan for the Planning Commission's review this spring. The Planning Commission was introduced to the draft plan on March 7 and will conduct its review on April 4, April 18, and May 2. We encourage interested community members to attend those meetings in person or online and provide verbal or written feedback to the Commission. We look forward to hearing from you as the Comprehensive Plan approaches adoption in December.

Inglewood Middle School Athletic Field Improvement Construction will begin soon!

Timeline

- Feasibility Study: April 2021 - February 2022 (Complete)
- **Feasibility Approved** as Complete by City **Council:** Feb 15, 2022 (Complete)
- **Design, Construction** Documents, and **Permitting:** Summer 2022 - Spring 2023 (Complete)
- **Bidding and Award:** Summer / Fall 2023 (Complete)
- **Construction:** Spring 2024 - Summer 2024
- Field Opening: Fall 2024

Inglewood Middle School's athletic fields and track will be undergoing significant upgrades soon, marking the first major renovation since the school's initial construction in 1991. Construction is slated to begin in early April, with anticipated completion by the end of the summer.

This project is the latest in a 20-year partnership between the Lake Washington School District and the City of Sammamish to give the community access to District-owned fields outside of school hours.

The project focuses on eight acres on the west side of the school property. Currently, uneven natural grass fields, deteriorated cinder track, lack of lighting, and poor surface conditions make these facilities challenging to use in the winter. By repurposing the site, the fields will be available year-round.

Key improvements include the installation of synthetic turf and lights, an 8-lane rubberized track, new accessible parking stalls, and a gender-neutral restroom building. The proposed design will create space for two synthetic multi-purpose football, soccer, and lacrosse fields. To the south, a 200-foot softball field and a 300-foot baseball field, complete with batting cages, bullpens, and dugouts, will enhance the facility.

The renovations aim to provide a more inclusive and vibrant athletic environment for the school and community.
